Harbour Rise Landscaping Report

Landscaping Improvements at Harbour Rise, 2024/25.

During the 2024/25 financial year, the City of Joondalup further improved the garden beds at Harbour View Park, following the completion of the previous stage. The goal of this landscaping upgrade was to create a uniform, high-quality standard for sustainable gardens throughout the estate. The project included planting new vegetation, removing dead or deteriorating plants, and adding fresh mulch.

A similar approach to that achieved in Harbour View Park was also implemented by the City of Joondalup in Marbella Park, aiming to transform the aging garden bed into a more presentable one.





Furthermore, the City also finished installing fresh, pathogen-free pine bark mulch and native ground cover plants along the public access way in Foret Garden.

As part of the streetscape enhancements, Eze, Midi, and Var Terraces were revitalised with fresh mulch, providing an immediate refreshed appearance. In addition, turf renovations were completed in Marbella and Oahu Park.

WA Police Report

Senior Sergeant Jamie Brennan, Officer in Charge Hillarys Police Station

Hello everyone, I want to take a moment to share what's been happening in our area and what we've been focusing on at Hillarys Police Station.

Leadership & Priorities

I'm Senior Sergeant Jamie Brennan, Officer in Charge here at Hillarys. Our priorities remain clear: tackling family violence, burglary, stealing (including motor vehicles), and illicit drugs. We're also heavily involved in mental health tasks, hospital guards, and locating people at risk or missing.



Crime Trends

We've seen a steady operational workload compared to last year, but some trends stand out:

- Stealing offender processed rates have increased over the past five months.
- Burglary offender processed have grown steadily since late 2024.
- And importantly, offenders are increasingly coming into Hillarys from other areas to commit crimes.

Major Incidents & Operations

- Crime Spree Crackdown (Sept 2025): Joondalup Detectives and our team halted a spree across Hillarys, Sorrento, and Kallaroo—11 break-ins, 3 arrests, and over 150 charges laid.
- Night Safe Operation: High-visibility patrols at licensed venues and foreshore; edged weapon scans show low seizure rates.
- Knife Incident (Apr 2025): A serious public threat at Hillarys Boat Harbour was quickly contained.
- Trespassing: We're working with the Harbour Master and Yacht Club to educate youths and prevent damage.
- Boat Harbour Fire (Sept 2025): Lithium battery suspected as the cause; damage to infrastructure and vessels.
- Hoon Driving: Two major incidents—vehicles impounded, drivers disqualified.
- Halloween Patrols: Great collaboration with City of Joondalup to keep festivities safe.

Emerging Issues

We recently acted on intelligence about an e-bike 'ride out' linked to anti-social behaviour. Early engagement likely prevented the event—thanks to community tips and proactive patrols.

Community Safety. A Local Government and Whole Community Role

The City of Joondalup is committed to creating an environment for residents, businesses and visitors to enjoy, without fear, or the intrusion of crime or anti-social behaviour through proactive measures and strong partnerships. Community safety is a shared responsibility and requires a whole-of-community approach.



City of Joondalup Community Safety Plan

The City has been formally planning for community safety since 2009 and is currently finalising its third iteration of its Community Safety Plan. The Community Safety Plan 2025–2029 is the City’s formal plan for the safety and security of its community and that will highlight the variety and diversity of programs and services that are provided and/or supported by the City, and their unique contributions to the safety of residents, businesses and visitors. The plan is currently scheduled to be released for public comment in the first half of 2026.

Community Safety Field Services

Our Field Officers (formerly known as Rangers) conduct a range of statutory and discretionary duties on public and private property. These duties include the provision of education and enforcement regarding City Local Laws and State Legislation.

Their daily operations involve proactive patrols across public spaces including City owned car parks, and urban areas such as our parks and reserves. Officers respond to community reports and complaints, investigate incidents, and provide a visible presence in the community. They are often the first point of contact for residents seeking assistance with safety-related concerns and work collaboratively with other business units to resolve issues efficiently.

While the City’s Field Officers maintain a strong collaborative relationship with local WA Police, including participation in joint public safety initiatives, it is important to recognise that their powers, roles, and responsibilities are fundamentally different. The following table outlines core responsibilities and who to contact for particular issues, noting Field Officers can only act on Local Government and public property.

Field Officers operate on a rotating schedule that includes both morning and afternoon shifts, with coverage provided daily between 7:00am and 8:30pm, 365 days a year. While this ensures a consistent presence across the City during peak activity hours, Field Officers do not provide on-call or after-hours response services outside of these designated times.

City of Joondalup CCTV program

The City operates a comprehensive public area CCTV program designed to enhance community safety and support crime prevention efforts. The system includes both static and mobile cameras strategically located in key public spaces. These cameras are used to deter criminal and anti-social behaviour, monitor reported incidents in real time, and assist with emergency management, traffic monitoring, and event coordination. Importantly, the CCTV network is focused solely on publicly accessible areas and does not record private properties, ensuring the privacy of residents and businesses is maintained.

The footage captured by the City's CCTV systems is securely stored and made available only to authorised agencies such as WA Police, who use it to support investigations and prosecutions.

The City has a CCTV Rebate Scheme to encourage residents and businesses to install public-facing cameras, further expanding surveillance coverage. This initiative not only helps deter crime but also fosters a sense of safety and shared responsibility within the community.

To our Harbour Rise community members,

We are thrilled to continue supporting the Harbour Rise Association in 2025 and to remain an active part of this wonderful community. Harbour Rise continues to be one of the most sought-after pockets within Hillarys, and we warmly welcome all the new homeowners who have joined us over the past year. The estate saw 20 properties sold during the 2024/25 financial year, with homes consistently selling quickly due to strong buyer interest and limited stock — a clear reflection of the suburb's enduring appeal.

The broader Hillarys market has also enjoyed strong growth. The median house value rose from \$1,432,872 in June 2025 to \$1,512,841 by September 2025, representing a 5.5% increase in just the first quarter of the financial year. Over the full 2024/25 period, Hillarys recorded a 16.7% increase in median house prices, reflecting high demand and competition for quality homes. Across Perth, median house prices rose 16.4% while median unit prices increased 20%, highlighting the strength of the property market and cementing Hillarys as one of the city's premier coastal suburbs. As we enter the 2025/26 financial year, stock remains scarce, further driving prices higher as demand continues to outpace supply. As of the first week of October, Perth listings sit at 2,820 — a significant drop from 4,281 at the same time last year — underscoring the tight market conditions.

For Harbour Rise homeowners, these trends show continued equity growth and confidence in the local market. Homes in the estate, particularly those with premium features, ocean views, or convenient access to popular local cafes, restaurants and amenities, remain highly sought after, often selling within days of listing. Looking ahead, while the rapid growth of the past year may ease slightly, demand for homes in Harbour Rise and Hillarys is expected to remain strong. Limited stock and the lifestyle advantages of coastal living ensure this pocket continues to be a highly desirable address for buyers. We are proud to be

part of this vibrant community and remain committed to supporting residents with expert guidance as the market continues to evolve.

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A Message from Albert Jacob, former Mayor

As a lifelong resident, becoming Mayor of this remarkable community was a goal I set when I joined the Council in early 2006, nearly two decades ago. My family’s roots in this region trace back to the 1960s when my father migrated here. My wife and I grew up in this area and will continue raising our family here. Joondalup is a unique place, shaped by families from around the globe who have come to build new lives, creating one of the world’s most vibrant multicultural communities.

Upcoming developments, such as the Sorrento Surf Life Saving Club and major upgrades to Heathridge Park are poised to enhance our community further.

A commitment to environmental sustainability has been a priority, with efforts to expand our tree canopy, manage water resources efficiently, and promote waterwise practices within the community.

A New Pest Requires Vigilance Submitted by Community Member Bryan Saunders

Polyphagous shot-hole borer (PSHB) is an invasive beetle that infests a wide range of native and exotic trees (see the list in the link), causing damage by boring into the wood and spreading pathogenic fungi.

A Quarantine Area now exist in WA, divided into two zones. The Quarantine Area (QA) covers the entire Perth metropolitan area and restricts the movement of wood, green waste, mulch, live plants and plant materials.

National response to PSHB has transitioned from an eradication strategy to a long-term management approach after the National Management Group determined it was no longer feasible to eradicate it. Hillarys is in the Management Zone that covers a big area of suburban Perth.

Polyphagous shot-hole borer kills vascular tissue in trees causing dieback and tree death.

A national Transition to Management (T2M) response plan is being delivered by the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD). This phase includes development and implementation of strategies to slow the spread of PSHB through targeted surveillance, the creation of an Integrated Pest Management Program and provision of support and training for landowners to build capacity for long term management of the pest.

Under the national response plan, DPIRD’s tree pruning and removal program will focus on trees in the outer Perth metropolitan area that pose a risk of spreading the borer outside of the Quarantine Area (QA). All other landowners and managers in the Perth metropolitan area are now responsible for managing borer-affected trees.

Special presentations were made to Inspector Adrian Fuller, Hon Pam Beggs, Hon Cheryl Edwardes AO, Ian Goodenough, Christine Hamilton-Prime, and Albert Jacob in recognition of their significant contributions to the Harbour Rise community over many years.

Two highly esteemed HRA residents, Hon Pam Beggs and Hon Cheryl Edwardes AO, were also recently named Honorary Freemen of the City of Joondalup, the City's highest civic honour, for their outstanding service to the community.

Hon Pam Beggs was elected to State Parliament as the Member for Whitford in 1983, a seat she held for 10 years. She and Kay Hallahan were the first women to serve as Ministers in a Western Australian Labor Government. As Minister for Transport, she facilitated the first train from Perth to Joondalup, among numerous other achievements. Today, as President of the Whitford Senior Citizens' Club, Pam continues to advocate for older residents across the City.

Hon Cheryl Edwardes AO served as the State Member for Kingsley from 1989 and was a Cabinet Minister from 1993 to 2001. She held several senior frontbench portfolios and was the first woman appointed Attorney-General in Western Australia. As Environment Minister, she oversaw the opening of the Bibbulmun Track. Cheryl received the Order of Australia in 2016 for her "significant service to the people and Parliament of Western Australia."

Following the formal proceedings, attendees enjoyed the opportunity to socialise over supper.

Update from State Member for Hillarys

It is my pleasure to provide an update on some of the exciting State Government initiatives taking place in Hillarys and surrounds.

I'm looking forward to delivering on our \$14.1 million commitment to enhance Hillarys Boat Harbour. Central to this investment is the creation of a Family & Youth Plaza on the old Great Escape site, which could include a skate park, climbing wall and basketball court. Community consultation for this project will commence early next year, so you can have your say!

The funding commitment also includes a Universal Access Toilet and Family Change Pavilion, upgrades to the fishing platforms and a signalised pedestrian crossing on Whitfords Avenue. These upgrades will make the Harbour more enjoyable, safer and accessible for all.

Community safety at the Harbour continues to be a priority. Investments in the CCTV network and noise-activated hoon detecting cameras will help to address anti-social behaviour. The procurement of the new acoustic camera technology is scheduled to begin in the first half of 2026. Once this has been completed, the cameras will be deployed in various locations and evaluated as part of a trial. Ahead of the trial, WA Police will undertake community engagement activities to raise awareness and ensure the community understands how the project will work.

Education remains a central focus in my work for the electorate. I'm excited to announce that the \$23 million rebuild of Hillarys Primary School and the \$41 million redevelopment at Duncraig Senior Highschool are now both complete. I am now working with Duncraig SHS on Stage Two development.

Transport infrastructure continues to improve across the electorate. The Hepburn Avenue and Walter Padbury Boulevard roundabout is now complete, and the upgrades include safer pedestrian crossings, better lighting and improved cycling facilities.

At the recent election, I made a commitment to upgrade the Craigie Leisure Centre intersection on Whitfords Avenue. This project will install a roundabout, improving access for locals and aligning with a new entry to Pinnaroo Valley Memorial Park. The design concept plan is being finalised between Main Roads WA and the City of Joondalup, with construction expected to kick off mid next year.

I have been honoured to serve in a new role since the election, as the Parliamentary Secretary for Emergency Services; Corrective Services; Defence Industries; Veterans; Racing and Gaming. I am currently chairing a working group that is conducting a review into Firefighter Health and Wellbeing. Earlier this year I attended the Avalon Airshow, which was an opportunity to highlight the Cook Government's commitment to diversifying our economy by growing our defence and space capabilities here in WA.

Beyond Parliament, I continue to support local clubs and organisations, including in my role as Patron of Hillarys Yacht Club, Vice-Patron of Mullaloo and Sorrento Surf Life Saving Clubs, and Patron of the Whitfords Junior Football Club. These groups are vital to the fabric of our community, and I am proud to support their work.

I am committed to delivering on the promises I have made to our community, from upgrades at Hillarys Boat Harbour to investments in education, transport and local facilities. Update from Federal Member for Moore

G'day Harbour Rise residents,

I'm Tom French, your Federal Member for Moore. It's a privilege to represent this beautiful part of Perth's coastline, from Trigg to Hillarys to Iluka — and to work on behalf of the people who've built the communities we all enjoy today.

Many Harbour Rise residents have spent decades working, volunteering, raising families and contributing to local life. You've earned the right to security, good health and a fair go in retirement — and that's exactly what the Australian Government is working to deliver.

Making life more affordable

Many older Australians are feeling the pinch as the cost of everyday essentials — from groceries to power bills — keeps climbing. To help ease the pressure, the Labor Government has rolled out targeted cost-of-living support, including energy rebates, higher Commonwealth Rent Assistance, and expanded bulk-billing for pensioners and concession card holders.

We've also strengthened the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme (PBS) — cutting the cost of more than 1,200 common medicines and lowering the PBS co-payment to its lowest level in over a decade. That means cheaper prescriptions and more money left for the things that matter.

Better healthcare and aged care

We all want peace of mind when it comes to our health. The Government is expanding Medicare Urgent Care Clinics across Perth's north, giving people faster access to bulk-billed treatment without the long wait in emergency departments.

For older Australians, aged care reform remains a top priority. We've introduced stronger staffing standards, 24/7 nursing in residential facilities and clearer reporting so families know their loved ones are receiving quality care.

Thousands of additional Home Care Packages are also being rolled out — giving people more choice to stay in their own homes longer, with the support they need to do so safely and comfortably.



Staying connected and engaged

There's strong support for older Australians who want to stay active and confident with new technology. Through the Be Connected program, anyone aged 50 and over can join free digital-skills sessions at Whitford Senior Citizens' Club and Whitford Library to learn everything from sending photos to spotting online scams. And for those with a WA Seniors Card, new rebates and discounts keep everyday costs — from public transport to power bills — a little easier to manage.
